Reading at home with children ages **3–7** is one of the most powerful ways to support their overall development — academically, socially, and emotionally. Here's why it matters so much:

1. Builds Early Literacy Skills

- **Vocabulary growth:** Hearing and discussing stories introduces children to words they might not hear in everyday conversation.
- **Phonemic awareness:** Listening to rhymes, rhythms, and sounds in stories helps them recognize the building blocks of language.
- **Print awareness:** They begin to understand how books work — reading left to right, recognizing letters, and connecting print with meaning.

2. Strengthens Cognitive Development

- Reading stimulates imagination and critical thinking.
- Stories help children learn about cause and effect, sequencing, and problem-solving.
- Nonfiction books introduce them to the world — animals, nature, emotions, science, and more.

3. Enhances Communication and Listening Skills

- Reading aloud encourages children to listen attentively and express their ideas.
- Discussing stories helps them practice forming opinions, predicting outcomes, and asking questions.

4. Builds Emotional Intelligence and Empathy

- Through characters and stories, children explore emotions safely.
- They learn to understand others' feelings, perspectives, and experiences.

5. Strengthens the Parent–Child Bond

- Reading together creates warm, shared moments of connection and comfort.
- A consistent reading routine fosters security, attention, and love for learning.

6. Encourages a Lifelong Love of Reading

- When reading is fun and routine at home, children associate books with pleasure, not obligation.
- This positive attitude supports better learning outcomes later in school.

Tips for Parents

- Read **daily**, even for just 10–15 minutes.
- Use **expression and excitement** — make it engaging!
- Let your child **choose** the book sometimes.
- Talk about the story — ask “What do you think will happen next?”
- Keep **books within reach**, such as on low shelves or in baskets.
